Cortland League of Women Voters (LWV) 2016-2018 Focus: *Making Democracy Work®*

Cortland County Administrator: History & Legislative Timeline

- 1980s County Legislature discussed creating a position for professional oversight of operations
- 1990 & 1992 Resolutions to create position did not pass
- June 1994 Personnel Subcommittee chaired by Sandy Price recommended Administrator over executive, business manager, or fulltime Legislature Chairperson
- 1994 & 1997 Resolutions to create position did not pass
- 2002 Legislature enacted Local Law 7 creating County Administrator appointed by Legislature
- April 2003 Legislature hired Scott Schrader as County Administrator
- 2003 LL3 designated County Administrator as Budget Officer
- 2010 LL2 allowed term of office up to 4 years for County Administrator
- 2010 Schrader left post; Legislature hired Martin Murphy for 4-year term
- 2014 Murphy left post
- 2015 Legislature revised job description of County Budget and Finance Director; Hired Peggy Mousaw
- 2015 Legislature divided administrative duties between Mousaw, County Attorney Karen Howe, and Legislature Chairperson Donnell Boyden
